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13d. Rehabilitative Services.

Definition of Services

Rehabilitative Services are designed to provide a group of needed mental health and substance abuse services to certain Medicaid recipients in order to restore these individuals to their highest possible functioning level. They are limited to individuals who are at risk of entering or reentering a mental health or hospital facility, those services of Human Service Centers provided by staff in settings outside the facility and to services provided to individuals who have transitioned from the State Hospital.

Services provided include behavioral intervention services that consist of developing and implementing a regimen that will reduce, modify or eliminate undesirable behaviors and/or introducing new methods to induce alternative positive behaviors and management including improving life skills. Other services include individual therapy, family therapy in which the Medicaid recipient takes part, group therapy, medication management, and mental health and substance abuse assessments.

All children are eligible for these rehabilitative services under EPSDT and are eligible to receive these and all other medically necessary services.

These services must be provided to, or directed exclusively toward, the treatment of the Medicaid eligible individual.

There are no duplication of billed services provided to clients at the same time.

Rehabilitative Services do not include the following:

- a. Room and board services;
- b. Services provided to residents of institutions for mental diseases;
- c. Services that are covered elsewhere in the State Medicaid plan;
- d. Educational, vocational and job training services;
- e. Recreational and social activities;
- f. Habilitation Services; and
- g. Services provided to inmates of public institutions.

The Department of Human Services, through the provider agreement, contracts with entities to provide rehabilitative services. The entities are to be established for the purpose of providing rehabilitative services and must demonstrate to the Department that they understand the rehabilitative needs of the Medicaid clients by:

- Documenting an understanding of the transportation challenges of some Medicaid clients and assisting clients with those challenges.
- Documenting an understanding of the unique needs of the Medicaid population and showing experience with coordination of services for similar client needs;
- Maintaining case files for each Medicaid beneficiary and evidence of compliance with the practitioner qualifications;
- Documenting how the entity will notify recipients of any limitations on amount, duration or scope of the beneficiary's services are about to be reached or have been exceeded.

The Entities must also have procedures in place to assure that rehabilitative services are: (a) provided according to a plan of care, (b) are delivered within a quality framework, and (c) are measured for outcomes. A written summary of how an entity will ensure this is required upon initial Medicaid enrollment. Individual practitioners must meet the qualifications detailed in the Provider Qualifications table and must be employed by an entity that has a provider agreement with the Department. The practitioner is responsible for maintaining the individual qualifications outlined in the Provider Qualifications table.

Eligibility for Services

The following requirements must be met before rehabilitative services can be provided through the North Dakota Medicaid Program.

- 1) The recipient must be eligible for the Medicaid Program.
- 2) The service must have been recommended by a practitioner of the healing arts within the scope of their practice under state law by providers affiliated with the North Dakota Department of Human Services.
- 3) The recipient must have a mental health or substance abuse disorder, and must have one of the following circumstances.

- a) An individual must be at risk of entering or reentering a mental health facility or hospital. Eligibility is determined by the Department of Human Services.
- b) An individual who requires medication management and consultation to ensure the maintenance of his/her best functioning level. Eligibility is determined by the Department of Human Services, and
- 4) The recipient must be from a family that is in crisis and at risk of major dysfunction that could lead to disruption of the current family makeup or in a family that has experienced a disruption that has resulted in disruption of the family or
- 5) The recipient is in need of mental health, substance abuse or behavioral intervention and management services that are provided by qualified entities.
- 6) The recipient has recently been released from the State Mental Facility into a transitional residential setting of not more than 16 beds.

Limitations

Services to families in crisis and at risk of disruption are limited to no more than six months of services unless prior approval is received from the Department of Human Services.

13d. Rehabilitative Services.

Definition of Services

Rehabilitative Services are designed to provide a group of needed mental health and substance abuse services to certain Medicaid recipients in order to restore these individuals to their highest possible functioning level. They are limited to individuals who are at risk of entering or reentering a mental health or hospital facility, those services of Human Service Centers provided by staff in settings outside the facility and to services provided to individuals who have transitioned from the State Hospital.

Services provided include behavioral intervention services that consist of developing and implementing a regimen that will reduce, modify or eliminate undesirable behaviors and/or introducing new methods to induce alternative positive behaviors and management including improving life skills. Other services include individual therapy, family therapy in which the Medicaid recipient takes part, group therapy, medication management, and mental health and substance abuse assessments.

All children are eligible for these rehabilitative services under EPSDT and are eligible to receive these and all other medically necessary services.

These services must be provided to, or directed exclusively toward, the treatment of the Medicaid eligible individual.

There are no duplication of billed services provided to clients at the same time.

Rehabilitative Services do not include the following:

- a. Room and board services;
- b. Services provided to residents of institutions for mental diseases;
- c. Services that are covered elsewhere in the State Medicaid plan;
- d. Educational, vocational and job training services;
- e. Recreational and social activities;
- f. Habilitation Services; and
- g. Services provided to inmates of public institutions.

The Department of Human Services, through the provider agreement, contracts with entities to provide rehabilitative services. The entities are to be established for the purpose of providing rehabilitative services and must demonstrate to the Department that they understand the rehabilitative needs of the Medicaid clients by:

- Documenting an understanding of the transportation challenges of some Medicaid clients and assisting clients with those challenges.
- Documenting an understanding of the unique needs of the Medicaid population and showing experience with coordination of services for similar client needs;
- Maintaining case files for each Medicaid beneficiary and evidence of compliance with the practitioner qualifications;
- Documenting how the entity will notify recipients of any limitations on amount, duration or scope of the beneficiary's services are about to be reached or have been exceeded.

The Entities must also have procedures in place to assure that rehabilitative services are: (a) provided according to a plan of care, (b) are delivered within a quality framework, and (c) are measured for outcomes. A written summary of how an entity will ensure this is required upon initial Medicaid enrollment. Individual practitioners must meet the qualifications detailed in the Provider Qualifications table and must be employed by an entity that has a provider agreement with the Department. The practitioner is responsible for maintaining the individual qualifications outlined in the Provider Qualifications table.

Eligibility for Services

The following requirements must be met before rehabilitative services can be provided through the North Dakota Medicaid Program.

- 1) The recipient must be eligible for the Medicaid Program.
- 2) The service must have been recommended by a practitioner of the healing arts within the scope of their practice under state law by providers affiliated with the North Dakota Department of Human Services.
- 3) The recipient must have a mental health or substance abuse disorder, and must have one of the following circumstances.

- a) An individual must be at risk of entering or reentering a mental health facility or hospital. Eligibility is determined by the Department of Human Services.
- b) An individual who requires medication management and consultation to ensure the maintenance of his/her best functioning level. Eligibility is determined by the Department of Human Services, and
- 4) The recipient must be from a family that is in crisis and at risk of major dysfunction that could lead to disruption of the current family makeup or in a family that has experienced a disruption that has resulted in disruption of the family or
- 5) The recipient is in need of mental health, substance abuse or behavioral intervention and management services that are provided by qualified entities.
- 6) The recipient has recently been released from the State Mental Facility into a transitional residential setting of not more than 16 beds.

Limitations

Services to families in crisis and at risk of disruption are limited to no more than six months of services unless prior approval is received from the Department of Human Services.
